**CORONER'S INQUEST.** — An inquest was held at 11 o'clock on Saturday morning, at the Australian Arms Inn, Hindley-street, on the body of Frederick George Strong, late one of the letter-carriers at the Post Office. It appeared that the deceased, who was a man of intemperate habits, had passed the preceding evening at a friend's house, at the west end of Hindley-street. There was a small party there, who had met for the sake of a little music. The deceased, after partaking of two or three glasses of brandy and water, lay down on the floor and fell asleep, and was found by the friend at whose house he had slept in the same position on Saturday morning. He did not answer when spoken to, and, as they believed that he was dead, Mr. Woodforde, the surgeon, was sent for, by whom he was pronounced to have been dead for some hours. Mr. Woodforde stated that he had examined the body, and found no marks of violence on it. He considered that the deceased died from disease of the heart, hastened by habitual intemperance. The chest was much swollen and enlarged over the region of the heart; and he had frequently complained of palpitation. After a short deliberation, the Jury, with the advice of the Coroner, returned a verdict of "Died by the visitation of God" It is understood that the deceased had no relatives in the colony. He had been stopping for sometime at Thompson's lodging house, Rosina-street, where he was said to have some trifling effects.
